examine two such epics side-by-side: the Exodus epic (Exodus—Joshua) from the Bible, in which the Israelites are transformed from slaves in Egypt into masters in Canaan, and Virgil's Aeneid, in which the vanquished at Troy are transformed into the victors at (what will become) Rome. Through a careful consideration of both stories we will seek to better understand each epic in its own right as well as what

the two stories have in common and what makes each story unique.

Students may wish to review Adler and Van Doren's *How to Read a Book* prior to, or concurrent with, this course. There is no official homework for Week 1 but a review of a review of the Book of Genesis and of Homer's *Iliad* and *Odyssey* will be helpful.
