Course Overview Email

Welcome to this course! Over the course of six weeks, I will guide you into dmukherjee@uchicago.edu starting a novel and staying motivated while writing the first chapters! This online

> class will offer craft discussions, intensive study of a mentor text, instructor feedback on a synopsis, as well as approximately 40 pages of work. We will use

> Canvas for online interactions and Zoom for live webinars. You will develop a supportive creative cohort as you work on developing your novel-in-progress, and

by the end of the six weeks, you should have at least forty pages of a novel

completed, though it need not be in polished form.

This course will also benefit writers who have started a novel, but need some help in finding their inspiration or motivation again.

COURSE GUIDELINES

- Assignments should be completed by Saturday, 11:59 p.m, of the week that they are due. Each new week begins on Monday.
- There will be three milestone submissions due to the instructor including the Introductory 5 pages; first chapter; any other chapter (total of 40 pages).
- Manuscripts should be formatted in Word (not a PDF) and double-spaced. Please number pages and include your name and your novel's name on the first page.
- New material will be posted on Canvas every Friday. New discussion boards will open at the beginning of each new topic being addressed.
- I will check discussion boards on Tuesdays and Fridays. If you have an urgent question, email me directly at dmukherjee@uchicago.edu.
- This is a generative workshop, and you will be strongly encouraged to progress on your own novels. You will begin this course by setting a realistic goal of writing a certain number of words every week (I will help you decide on a number that is realistic for you).

Modality

Remote learning

- The Zoom links and related information for the webinars will be available
 a few days before the scheduled webinars. There will be technical
 assistance available before the first webinar.
- I will consult with each student during an individual one-on-one meeting (10 minutes online). This meeting will be scheduled in the third week of the course, at a mutually agreeable time. This interaction will focus on feedback given to your work and any questions related to that feedback.
- Feedback on student manuscripts will also come in the form of in-text comments, whether from the instructor or a peer-review.

CLASSROOM ETIQUETTE

As we may be addressing controversial topics in our class discussions, students are expected to be respectful and considerate of others.

- 2. Save The Cat! Writes a Novel, by Jessica Brody ISBN 978-0399579745
- 3. In addition, you will choose a "mentor text"—a novel written by an author whose work has been influential or may be instructive (this may include works translated into English, or published outside the United States). The mentor text will allow you to customize your learning experience with independent study. I will help students in need of assistance in choosing an author whose style or content may compliment the student's own.
